


### Spirit Week

The total cast and crew combined time and effort totaling 3,000 hours to produce this blockbuster.


All in all it was a tremendous play and was presented with professional skill by our high school actors.

Job well done, cast and crew of WEST SIDE STORY!!







### N.H.S.Induction Ceremony


### Rampage-Aries Staff and Ensemble


Vo-Ed Center Attracts Some Springfield Students

This program was designed to give district high school students the opportunity to develop skills for career education.






#### Commencement
