


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Looking Back To The Beginning

In September of 1952, Springfield voters went to the polls to provide extra milage to purchase a site for the future Springfield High School. Following this millage approval, the voters approved a \$1.2 million bond issue and extra taxes on June 8, 1953, to build a new elementary and high school.

Contracts were awarded in April of 1955, and the high school was opened in September of 1956 although it wasn't complete. Construction work was still needed to complete the shop room and gymnasium which was finished for the 1956-57 basketball season and the first of five Class C Districts held there. The class of 1957, the first graduating class, put an end to the Board of Education paying tuition for students to continue their education at Lakeview High School or Battle Creek Central High School. The school board members at the time the building was opened included Leo C. Boice, Howard H. Campbell, Guy H. Chesbro, Dennis McIntyre, and William P. Schieber. The first superintendent of the new building was Mr. James Rossman, and Mr. Charles Miller was the first principal.

A dedication program took place on January 6, 1957. Guido A. Binda, the architect of the design-winning building, gave the presentation of the school, and Leo C. Boice, President of the Board of Education, accepted the building.

An interesting subject surrounding Springfield High School was the swimming pool issue. The people of Springfield voted in favor of a bond issue to build a swimming pool. However, Springfield High was built on a marshy area, and consequently, when the bids were submitted, the pool was going to be more money to complete because of the water problem. The voters of Springfield went back to the polls and this time voted no on the extra money needed. Therefore, the pool was never built. The bond issue sat earning interest in the bank until it was paid off. When the last bond holders were paid back, the interest earned went toward the needs of the high school.

The 1960's brought much athletic success. The basketball team won the first trophy in 1960 by defeating arch-rival Pennfield in the District Basketball Championship, and 1961 brought the only undefeated basketball team. In addition to the success in sports, the Springfield teachers were the first in the state to negotiate a contract.

With the 1970's, the school experienced a great loss of enrollment. The closing of Fort Custer early in the decade led to the decrease. The basketball team kept up the winning pace as a state semifinalist, and the football team captured a state championship in 1971. Also, in 1976 Mr. Charles Miller, principal for 20 years, retired, and Mr. Douglas Kane became principal.



He later became Superintendent of Battle Creek Public Schools when Jack Mawdsley left to take a job at the Kellogg Foundation. 



The Junior Varsity Quiz Bowl team came home victorious after taking first place in the SMAA League with a record of 9-1. The Varsity Team took sixth for the season.










Seniors Hold Mock Wedding






Homecoming Sparked By Crowning King And Queen

Spirit Week Revves Up S.H.S.












J.V. Rams Carry Ball For Springfield

Our fighting Rams had a rough season despite their season record of one win, eight losses, and one tie.

















Final Commencement Fills W.K. Kellogg Auditorium


